MARTIN is a parish and village on the borders of Hampshire and Dorsetshire, in South Damerham hundred, and Fordingbridge Poor-law union, 4 miles N.E. from Cranbourne, and $9\frac{1}{2}$ S.W. by S. from Salisbury. The living is a perpetual curacy, value £80 per annum, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of South Damerham, and held by the Rev. George Warwick Bampfylde Daniell, M.A. The church is an ancient edifice, in the Early English style, with steeple and three bells. Here is a National school. There is a charity here bequeathed by the late William Talk, of 8s. per week to six poor and deserving persons in this parish. The population in 1861 was 615, with 4,501 acres.

MELKSHAM is a parish, market, union town and railway station, in the hundred of the same name, distant 100 miles W. by S. from London, 30 N.W. from Salisbury, 6 N.E. of Bradford, $5\frac{1}{2}$ N.E. of Trowbridge, 7 W. of Devizes, $9\frac{1}{2}$ from Westbury, 14 from Warminster, $15\frac{1}{2}$ from Frome, 12 E. from Bath, $6\frac{1}{4}$ S. from Chippenham, and 5 S.S.E. from Corsham on the Wilts, Somerset, and Weymouth railway. The population in 1861 was 5,337, including 1,086 in Seend, and 12,572 acres of land. The manufactures are chiefly superfine broad cloths, flat and round ropes, haircloths, cocoa fibre and sacking; and there is considerable business in malting. Petty sessions are held by the Justices of the Peace for Melksham division

at the Town-hall on the last Tuesday in every month, and a County court for the recovery of small debts is likewise held at the same place, once in two months on Wednesdays. The Town-hall and cheese market form a spacious and well-arranged structure of white freestone, in the Italian style. The river Avon passes through the town, and is crossed by a bridge of four arches, with light and elegant balustrades; near are one of the largest corn-mills in the county, and an extensive cloth factory. The Wilts and Berks canal passes on the east of the town, and about $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile southward joins the Kennet and Avon canal. The market is held fortnightly, on Tuesday, for cattle, sheep, pigs, &c. An annual fair for cattle, sheep, horses, &c., is held in the Market-place on the 27th of July. The living is a vicarage, with the chapelries of Seend and Earl Stoke annexed, value £1,215 per annum, with residence, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury; the Rev. George Hume, M.A., is the incumbent. The church (St. Michael) is a spacious edifice of freestone, with a handsome embattled tower surmounted by pinnacles. The district chapelry of Whitley and Shaw is attached, of which the Rev. George Nutt, M.A., is the incumbent. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the vicar of Melksham. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan Methodists; and National, British and Infant schools. The Melksham union comprises six parishes. The Workhouse is a substantial stone building, situated in the village of Semington, about 2 miles from the town. Almshouses, Bath road, erected in 1862-3, by Miss Fowler. Melksham is a polling-place at elections for North Wilts. Walter Long, Esq., M.P., is lord of the manor.

BEANACRE and Blackmore are tithings; Shaw and Whitley form a chapelry.

MERE is a parish, hundred and union of itself, and small market town, 23 miles W. by N. from Salisbury, 102 W.S.W. from London, 7 W. of Hindon, 8 E. by N. from Wincanton, 6 from Semley railway station, and 4 from Gillingham railway station, locally situated on the borders of three counties—Wilts, Dorset, and Somerset. The parish comprises 7,400 acres, and a population in 1861 of 1,210, exclusive of the tithings, and in the whole parish 2,929. It is in the Hindon division of the county. Silk throwing is carried on here, and the town is lighted with gas. Mere constitutes a part of the Duchy of Cornwall; in the year 1253 permission was given to Richard, Earl of Cornwall, to build a castle on the hill, now known as Castle Hill, and afterwards to fortify it. Mere Park contains 810 acres. The Ashfield water rises from a
